

Child Safe Policy

1. Statement of Context and Purpose

The AGSV has a zero-tolerance policy for child abuse and is committed to promoting child safety, children's wellbeing and protecting children from abuse. AGSV runs sports events where staff may come into contact with children. Where staff do come into contact with children or otherwise deal with children in the course of their role, staff must ensure that they comply with the requirements set out in this Policy.

This Policy sets out key elements of AGSV's approach to child safety and has been developed to create and maintain a child safe organisation in accordance with the Child Safe Standards introduced by the Victorian Government. It also outlines:

- the overarching principles and values that guide its approach to child safety; and
- refers to the Code of Conduct which in turn provides the standards of expected behaviour and appropriate behaviour in dealing with children.

2. Application

This Policy applies to all employees, volunteers and contractors (collectively referred to as **staff** throughout this Policy);

To properly implement this Policy, all AGSV Member Schools must ensure that they implement a Child Safe Policy that complies with the child safety standards and Ministerial Order 870, which sets out specific requirements for registered schools in relation to child safety.

4. Definitions

Child means a person who is under the age of 18 years who attends an AGSV event.

Child abuse encompasses a broad range of matters set out in Part 6 of this Policy.

Child-connected work means work organised by AGSV and performed by an adult in AGSV's environment while children are present.

Child safety encompasses matters related to protecting all children from child abuse, managing the risk of child abuse, providing support to a child at risk of child abuse, and responding to incidents or allegations of child abuse.

Child Safe Officer is the first point of contact to provide advice and support to children, parents and staff regarding the safety and well-being of children at AGSV, as set out in the Child Safety Procedure.

AGSV's environment means any physical place made available to or used by AGSV for child-connected work.

Staff means an individual working in the AGSV environment who is directly engaged or employed by AGSV and/or a volunteer or a contracted service provider for the AGSV (whether or not a body corporate or any other person is an intermediary).

5. Overarching values and principles

AGSV's approach to child safety is guided by a number of overarching principles and values (which are set out below).

5.1 Commitment to child safety and best interests

AGSV is committed to child safety and wants children to be safe, happy and empowered. AGSV supports and respects all children, as well as staff and parents.

AGSV is committed to:

- embedding and promoting a culture of child safety;
- preventing child abuse and identifying risks early, and removing and reducing these risks;
- protecting the rights of all children to be safe, without fear of abuse or exploitation as outlined in the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (1989) and is committed to keeping children safe by all reasonable means:
- acting in children's best interests and keeping children safe;
- ensuring cultural safety for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children, for children from culturally and/or linguistically diverse backgrounds;
- providing a safe environment for children with a disability;
- actively working to empower children; and
- regularly training and educating staff on child abuse risks.

5.2 Zero tolerance for child abuse

AGSV has zero tolerance for child abuse and will not tolerate any form of child abuse, including by anyone who is working within AGSV's environment or in child-connected work.

AGSV has both legal and moral obligations to contact, as appropriate, the parents, school and/or relevant authorities when child safety concerns are raised and will comply with that obligation.

All instances of suspected child abuse, allegations of child abuse or child safety concerns must be reported to the Child Safe Officer and will be treated very seriously.

If staff believe a child is at immediate risk of abuse, they must <u>immediately</u> phone 000.

6. What is child abuse

Definition of child abuse as set out in the Education Training Report Act 2006 (Vic)

Child abuse includes:

- any act committed against a child involving:
 - o a **sexual offence**; or
 - an offence under section 49b(2) of the Crimes Act 1958, that is, the
 offence of "grooming" which prohibits communicating (including
 electronically) by words or conduct with a child with the intention of
 facilitating the child's engagement or involvement in a sexual offence with
 you or another adult;
- the infliction on a child of:
 - o **physical violence**; or
 - o serious emotional or psychological harm; and
- serious neglect of a child.

6.1 Physical violence and abuse

Physical violence occurs when a child suffers or is likely to suffer significant harm from a non-accidental injury or injuries inflicted by another person. Physical violence can be inflicted in many ways, including beating, shaking, burning or use of weapons.

6.2 Sexual offences and abuse

Sexual offences occur when a person involves a child in sexual activity, or deliberately puts the child in the presence of sexual behaviours that are exploitative or inappropriate to his/her age and development. Child sexual abuse can involve a range of sexual activity including fondling, masturbation, penetration, voyeurism and exhibitionism. It can also include exposure to or exploitation through pornography or prostitution, as well as grooming behaviour.

Possible physical indicators:	Possible behavioural indicators:

6.3 Serious emotional or psychological abuse

Serious emotional or psychological abuse occurs when harm is inflicted on a child through repeated rejection, isolation, or by threats or violence. It can include derogatory name-calling and put downs, or persistent and deliberate coldness from a person, to the extent where the behaviour of the child is disturbed or their emotional development is at serious risk of being impaired. Serious emotional or psychological abuse could also result from conduct that exploits a child without necessarily being criminal, such as encouraging a child to engage in inappropriate or risky behaviours.

6.4 Serious neglect

Serious neglect is the continued failure to provide a child with the basic necessities of life, such as food, clothing, shelter, hygiene, medical attention or adequate supervision, to the extent that the child's health, safety and/or development is, or is likely to be, jeopardized. Serious neglect can also occur if an adult fails to

adequately ensure the safety of a child where the child is exposed to extremely dangerous or life threatening situations.

7. Child safety actions taken by AGSV

AGSV has taken, and/or proposes to take, the actions set out below in order to:

- demonstrate its commitment to child safety and monitor its adherence to its Child Safe Policy;
- support, encourage and enable staff, parents, and children to understand, identify, discuss and report child safety matters; and
- support or assist children who disclose child abuse, or are otherwise linked to suspected child abuse.

As part of the screening process, the following key event personnel must have and, if requested, provide appropriate evidence of a valid WWCC (or other state equivalent) to show that they are suitable to work with children and young people in a school setting:

- All AGSV staff and Board members
- those paid by AGSV for their services (excluding bump in and bump out);
- volunteers;
- relevant contractors who may have unsupervised access to children; and
- anyone else who AGSV staff feel requires a WWCC due to the nature of the work that they are undertaking for AGSV

Any costs associated with gaining a valid WWCC will be the responsibility of the individual.

7.1 Development, maintenance, implementation and publication of child safe policies, procedures and codes of conduct

This Policy (along with the Code of Conduct and the Child Safe Procedure) guides staff on how to behave with children.

All staff must abide by AGSV's Code of Conduct which specifies the standards of conduct required when working with children. AGSV welcomes input from staff, as well as children and their families, regarding the development and content of the Code of Conduct.

We all have a responsibility to report an allegation of abuse if we have a reasonable belief that an incident took place. AGSV:

- takes all allegations seriously and has a procedure in place to enable allegations to be investigated thoroughly and quickly; and
- works to ensure all children and staff know what to do and who to tell if they
 observe abuse or are a victim, and if they notice inappropriate behaviour.

7.2 Appointment of Child Safe Officer

AGSV has appointed a Child Safe Officer as a first point of contact to provide advice and support to children, parents and staff regarding the safety and well-being of children during certain AGSV events (see the Child Safe Procedure).

The Child Safe Officer will receive appropriate training and support in relation to child safety, prevention of child abuse and responding to allegations of child abuse.

AGSV staff can contact the Child Safe Officer for further information regarding child safety and for any questions or concerns or reports of suspected or alleged child abuse.

7.3 Provision of counselling

AGSV will link children who disclose child abuse or are otherwise linked to suspected child abuse with an appropriate counselling service through the relevant member school.

7.4 Risk management strategies

AGSV proactively manages risks of abuse to children.

AGSV has developed and implemented risk management strategies regarding child safety which will identify and mitigate the risk(s) of child abuse in AGSV's environment by taking into account:

- the nature of AGSV's environment, for example risks posed by physical environments; and
- the activities expected to be conducted in that environment (including the provision of services by other volunteers from outside organisations); and
- the characteristics and needs of all children expected to be present in that environment.

Where risks of child abuse occurring in one or more of AGSV's environments are identified, the Child Safe Officer will:

- make a record of those risks;
- specify the action(s) AGSV will take to reduce or remove the risks (risk controls), which will take into account the nature of the risk and the diversity characteristics of the children affected by the risk.

The Child Safe Officer will monitor and evaluate the effectiveness of the implementation of its risk controls.

The Child Safe Officer will ensure (at least annually) that appropriate guidance and training is provided to themselves and staff about individual and collective obligations and responsibilities for managing the risk of child abuse; child abuse risks in AGSV's environment; and the current Child Safe Standards.

8. Consequences for Breach of this Policy

AGSV emphasises the need to fully comply with the requirements of this Policy. Any staff found to be in breach of the requirements of this Policy may be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including termination of employment (or engagement, where appropriate). Breaches may also result in disclosure to appropriate authorities and/or the Police.

9. Implications for Practice

9.1 At Board Level

To properly implement this Policy, AGSV must:

- ensure that this Policy is endorsed on an annual basis and following significant incidents if they occur;
- ensure that copies of this Policy are made available to all staff, for example in physical form in the briefing room and the break out area;
- ensure that this Policy is incorporated into the Board's record of current policies;
- ensure that this Policy is incorporated into AGSV's induction program, to ensure that all staff (particularly those who are engaged in child-connected work) are aware of the Policy, have read and understood the Policy, and acknowledge their commitment to comply with the policy;
- ensure that all staff are directed towards the Code of Conduct and the Child Safe Procedure; and
- ensure that this Policy is accessible to the public (including children and parents).

9.2 At Other Levels

To properly implement this policy, all AGSV staff must ensure:

- that they will abide by this Policy, the Code of Conduct and the Child Safe Procedure and assist AGSV in the implementation of this Policy; and
- that they have read and understood the definitions of child abuse outlined in this Policy.

9.3 At AGSV Member School Level

To properly implement this Procedure, all AGSV Member Schools must ensure that they implement a Child Safe Policy that complies with the Child Safe Standards and Ministerial Order 870, which sets out specific requirements for registered schools in relation to child safety.

The AGSV will require Member Schools to sign an annual attestation of compliance with this policy (see Appendix 2).
